BCC Information Sheet

Welcome to Bull City Commons—an eclectic cohousing community of folks from all over the country. What we have in common is a desire to be part of Durham's vibrant urban scene and to create a community based on mutual support, collaboration, and shared resources.



What is cohousing?

Cohousing communities are intentional, collaborative housing developments that combine common facilities with private homes to create resilient and successful neighborhoods. Design features and community size promote frequent interactions and close relationships. Neighbors play together, cook for one another, share tools, and make decisions collaboratively. Common property is managed and maintained by community members, providing more opportunities for growing relationships. Most cohousing communities are organized as townhouses or condominiums with a homeowners association. Cohousing is not a financial or legal model, but rather a descriptive term that shows the intent of these developments to cultivate a strong sense of community.

What is BCC's vision of cohousing?

BCC's 30 members—occupying 23 condo units—actively participate in the life and work of the community. We value diversity, respect, kindness, safety, connection, generosity, affordability, and environmental responsibility. Among our social gatherings are weekly meals, monthly potlucks, chef's dinners, movie and game nights, hikes, and workdays. All members participate in our monthly business meetings in addition to working circles. We are:

- *Self-governed*. We use Sociocracy as a governance framework. Sociocracy is an intentional process that enables all voices in the community to be heard and promotes decision-making by consent.
- Self-managed. All members contribute to maintaining our living spaces. Working circles carry out the tasks of
 managing our finances, coordinating social activities, landscaping the grounds, and maintaining the building's
 structure and systems.
- Self-supporting. Members develop and adhere to an annual budget for fiscal stability and responsibility.

We occasionally have units for sale, and we invite people who are interested in joining BCC to attend an Information Session and a Plenary meeting to see how we make decisions. - Would you enjoy working in a community garden or on landscaping projects in common areas?
- Do you like the idea of group activities such as hiking, movies, restaurants?
